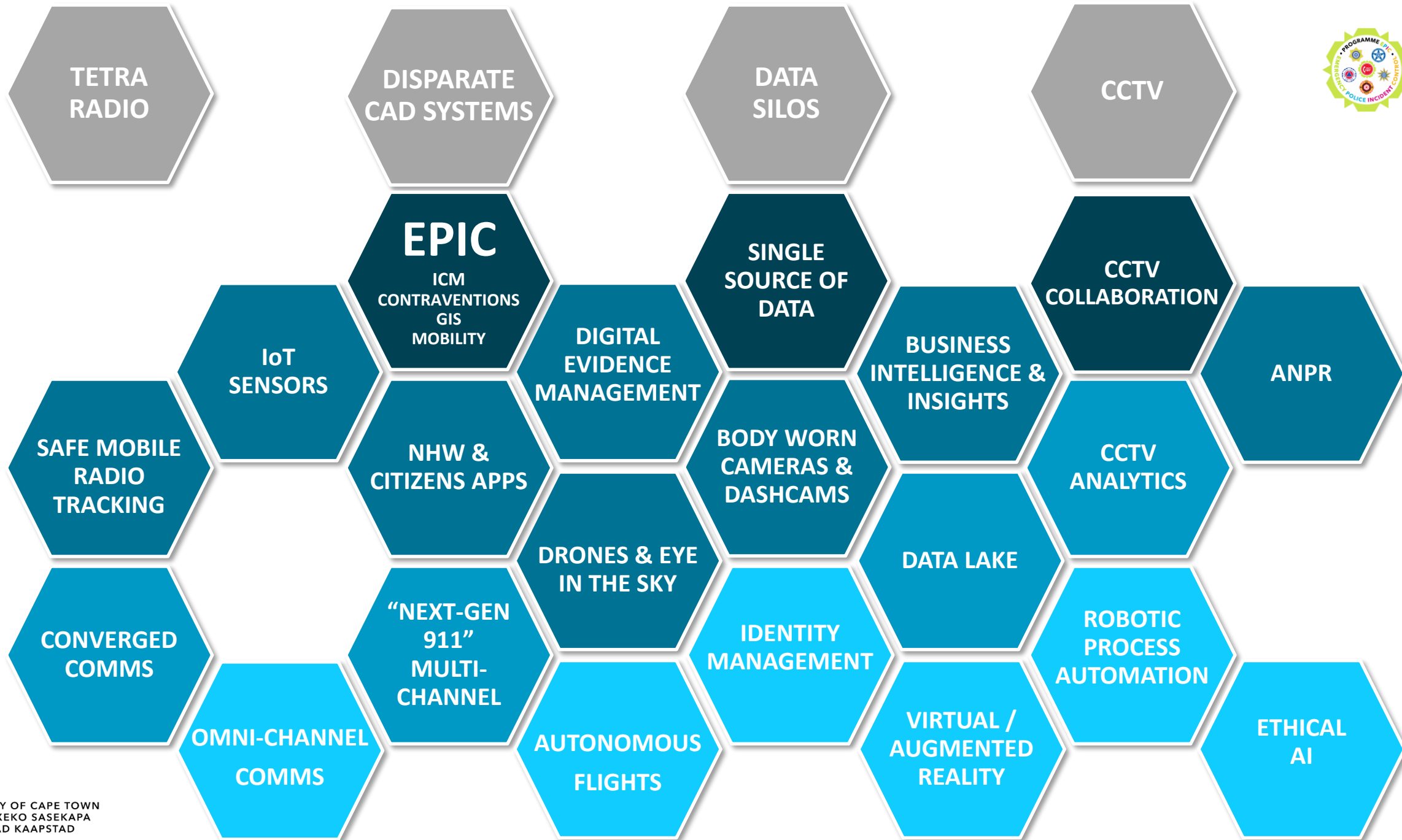

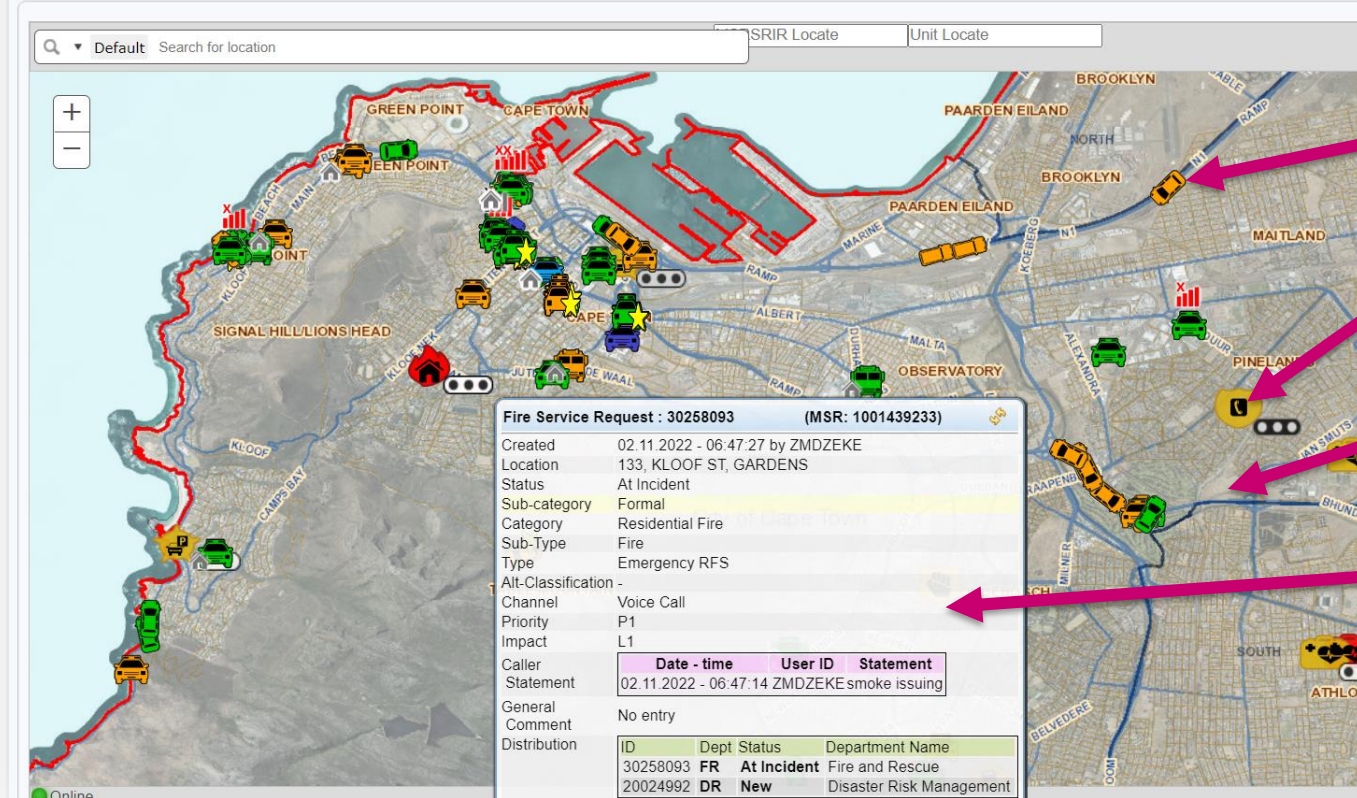

Common Operating Picture Map (All Depts)

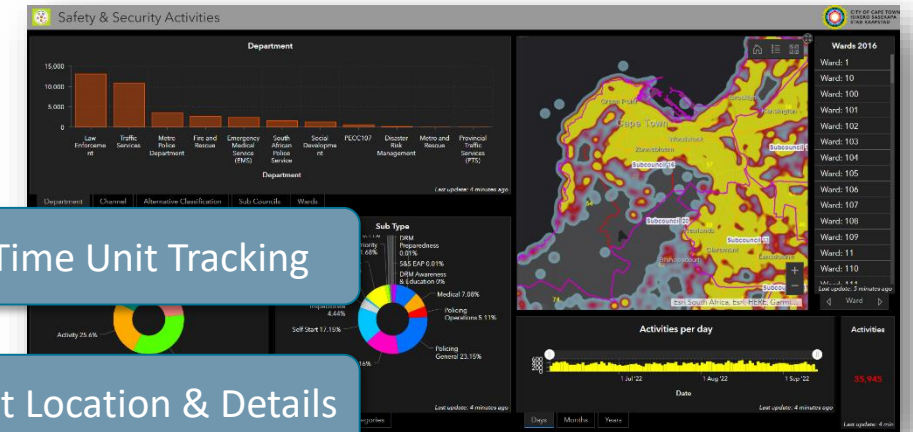

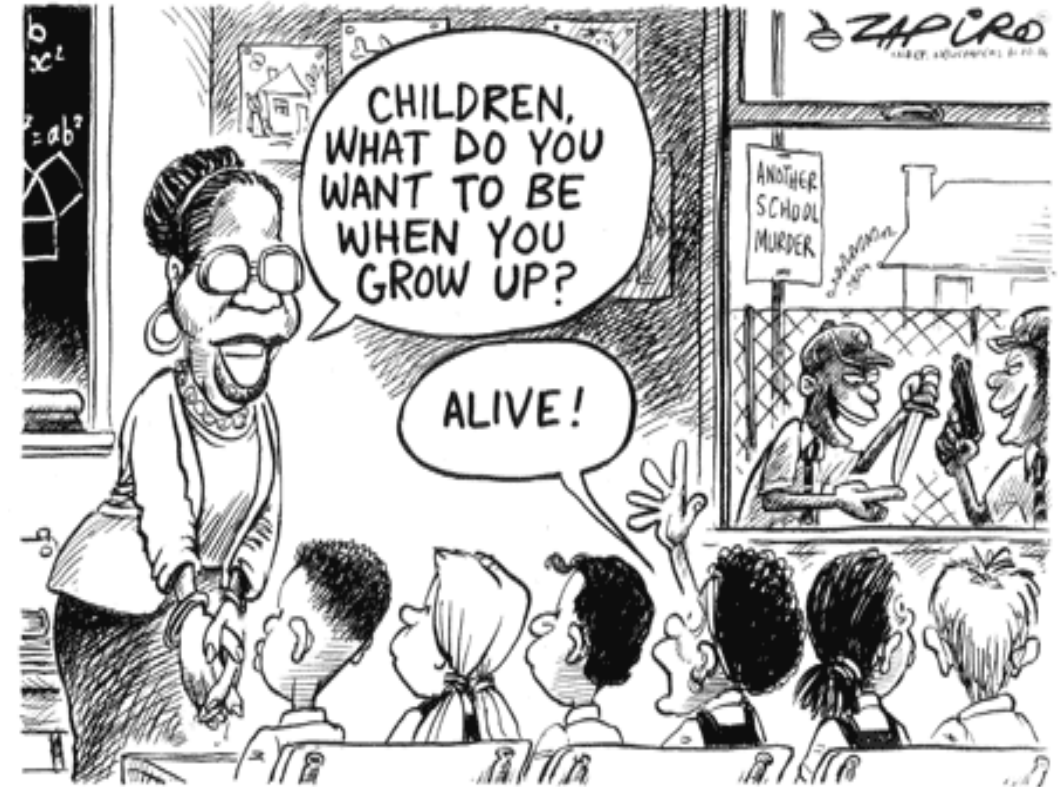


School Resource Officers – Role and responsibilities

In 2012, the WCED and the City of Cape Town officially launched a new joint pilot project – the SRO project. A School Resource Officer (SRO) is a Municipal Peace Officer assigned to a school on a long-term basis to help make schools safe learning environments.

Responsibilities include:

- Early identification of illegal activities by at risk youth;
- Developing 'safe movement corridors' with local security agencies, allowing learners to get to and from schools safely;
- Preventing delinquency through close contact and positive relationships with learners;
- Patrolling school grounds to stop criminal or delinquent behaviour; and being visible within the school community and attending and participating in school functions



Purpose

- The **National Association for School Resource Officers** (NASRO) details the SRO's role as threefold:
(1) as an **educator**; (2) as an **informal counselor** or mentor and (3) as a **law enforcement officer**.

METRO police are to be deployed at Cape Town schools by the beginning of next year as part of a R5 million school safety programme proposed by the City of Cape Town.

The city is working with the provincial education department and Safe Schools to introduce a School Resource Officers (SRO) programme, according to JP Smith, mayoral committee member for safety and security. It will begin in certain schools, with the aim of deploying metro officers to selected schools, and the establishment of a youth and civilian academy.

"Ultimately, we would like to have an SRO in each school in the city, at least.

"The SROs will be at the schools permanently working on the safe movement corridor to and from the schools – where officers patrol, where there are CCTV cameras.

"They will also look at environmental safety factors at the school, like the fencing and people on school grounds not meant to be there.

"They will make sure that if there's violence on school grounds they quickly summon other metro police to respond," Smith explained.

The city is in the process of selecting the first 10 officers, at a total cost of about R2m, half of whom will be placed at schools, while the other half work at the academy.

"The idea is to formally start next year. We want SROs

to start training between now and September. We have brought down an expert, who was an SRO, to help us with the process," Smith said.

The youth and civilian academy, which will require about R2m, will focus on teaching youth and community members about the criminal justice system, and how to assist police officers.

The city is considering its policing college in Observatory as potential premises for the academy. Pupils will be invited to weekend courses on subjects such as bullying, legislation and civil society.

"Part of that may be a visit to Follsmoor prison to see what prison is really like, or getting them to go on a ride-along with officers," Smith said.

He got the idea for the programme during a visit to US schools in April last year, and local efforts have been in the pipeline for more than a year.

The city is working with the provincial education department and Safe Schools to select schools, and consult with principals and communities.

"The schools aren't finalised yet. The department (of education) will present a list of 10 schools and we will select five from that.

"We will probably choose one school each in Hanover Park, Maitland, Gugulethu, Lavender Hill and Nyanga," Smith suggested.

Education department spokesman Paddy Attwell confirmed the initiative, saying it was the product of discussions with various roleplayers.

"We will provide further details when we announce the pilot programme," he said, adding that it would help expand the range of measures already in place to assure school safety.

According to the education department, 90 stabbing incidents on school grounds have been reported during the first half of this year.

Bronagh Casey, spokeswoman for Education MEC Donald Grant, said many of the incidents were gang related.

Smith said the programme was an innovative approach to dealing with violence and gang activity at schools. "Communities' loyalty is firmly with the bad guys, especially with our apartheid history. The public don't trust police from an early age, that's why they're (police) not making progress.

"The big part of this is the relationships these SROs develop with the children and the communities, which sporadic police visits don't achieve," he added.

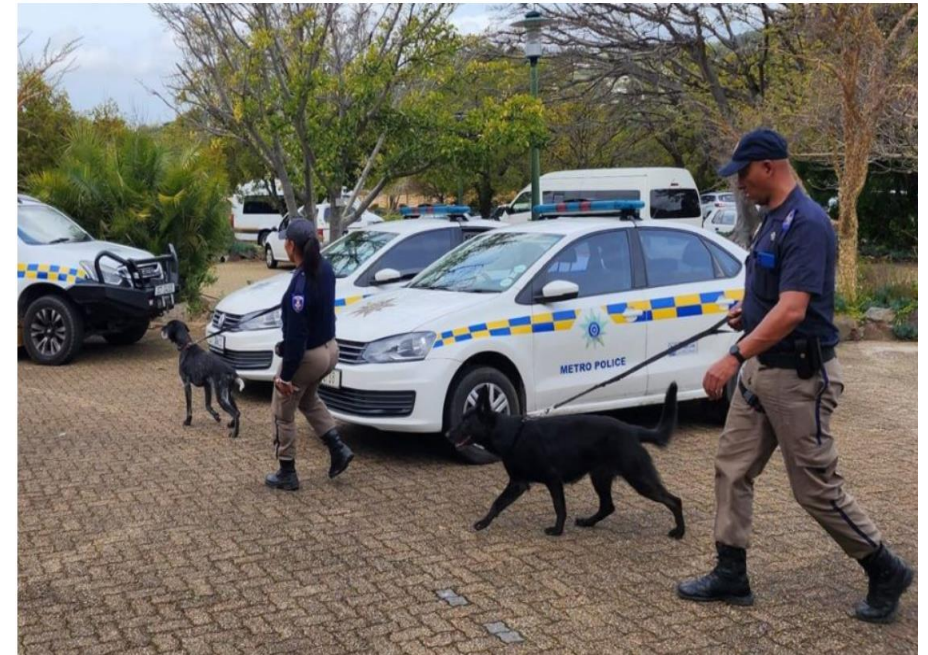

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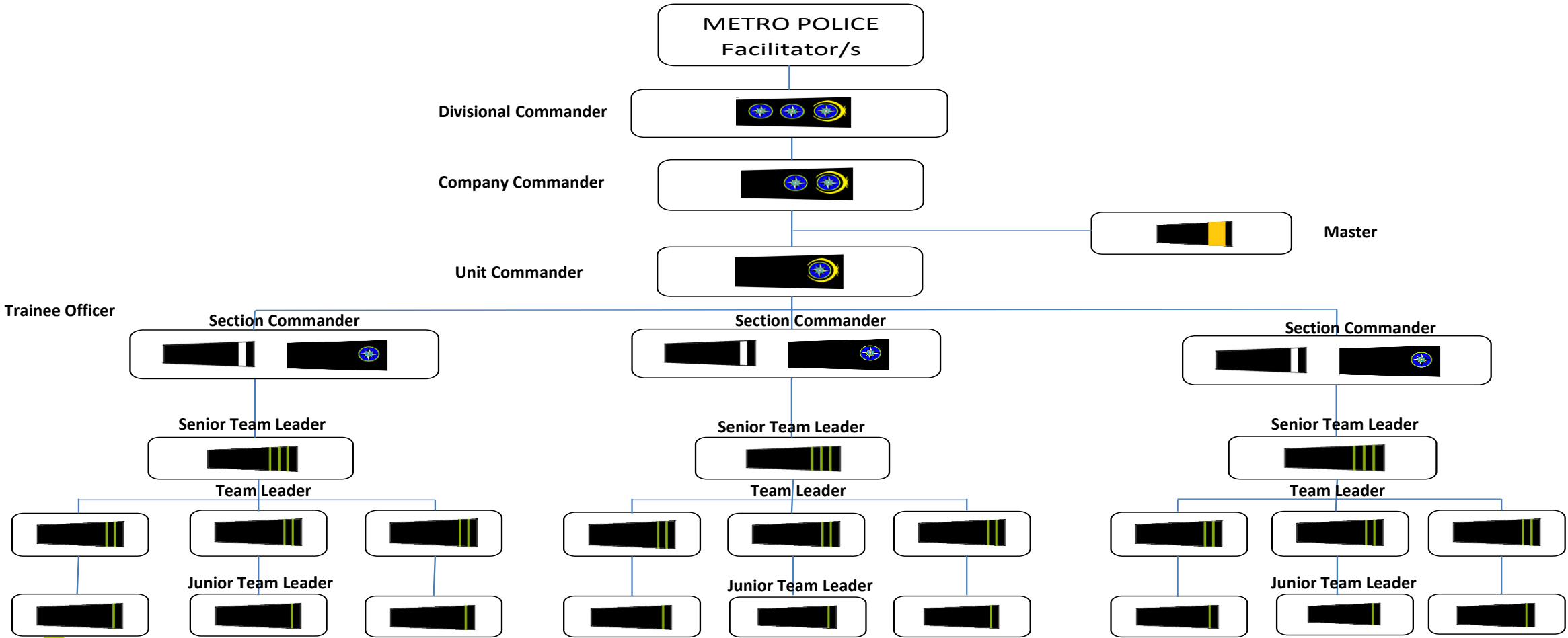

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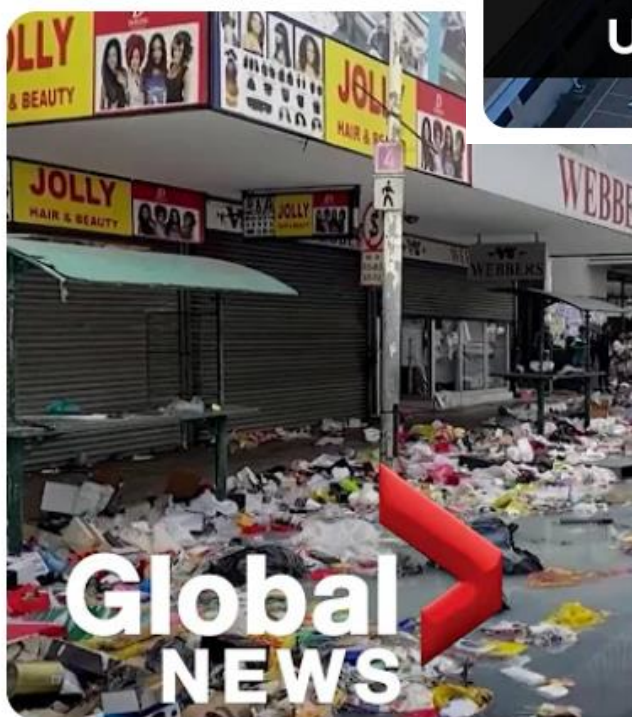


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Civil disorder – “insurrection riots”

- The 2021 South African unrest, also known as the **July 2021 riots**, the **Zuma unrest** or **Zuma riots**, was a wave of civil unrest that occurred in **South Africa's KwaZulu-Natal and Gauteng provinces** from 9 to 18 July 2021, sparked by the **imprisonment of former President Jacob Zuma** for contempt of court.
- Resulting protests against the incarceration **triggered wider rioting and looting**, much of it said to be undertaken by people not in support of Zuma and fuelled by job layoffs and economic inequality worsened by the COVID-19 pandemic policies. The unrest began in the province of KwaZulu-Natal on the evening of 9 July, and spread to the province of Gauteng on the evening of 11 July, and was **the worst violence that South Africa had experienced since the end of Apartheid**.
- The violence quickly escalated, and by the morning of 12 July, **multiple companies and malls were forced to close following widespread looting and violence**. An incident occurred at Southgate Spar, a supermarket near a township in Pietermaritzburg, as an unnamed 15-year-old boy was shot in the chest with a rubber bullet fired by police in the midst of the unrest and later succumbed to his wounds. The incident played a part in escalating the unrest.
- **354 people died** due to the unrest according to the South African government, while **5,500 were arrested** by 12 August 2022. In KwaZulu-Natal, 2,763 people had been arrested by 24 July 2021.

- Neighbourhood Watches and other civil society safety partners participated in a virtual dry run on Saturday, 11 May 2024, coordinated from a Joint Operations Centre in Goodwood, there were scenarios in five areas – protest action in Hout Bay, Costa Da Gama (Muizenberg) and Sir Lowry's Pass Village; as well as the escorting of food trucks in Strand, and a missing person in the Milnerton area.

- E.g. we start hearing chatter about a protest or flooding or any other public safety risk, the organisations on our dedicated WhatsApp channel can easily help verify or confirm information, but more importantly, the platform will give them a direct line to our Joint Operations Centre.

Changing the language we use to talk about gangsterism and CVE

Drugs and transnational crime

- Willem Els of the **Institute for Security Studies** said Cape Town and South Africa had become a hub for cartels who shipped cocaine and heroin to our shores
- 2021 case of the vessel at Saldanha Harbour where R583m worth of cocaine was found and three Bulgarian men were sentenced to 60 years' imprisonment and their assets worth R46.5m forfeited to the state
- a bakkie towing a 12-foot ski boat where 800kg of compressed pure cocaine were found with an estimated street value of R400m in 2021 was also linked to cartels.
- He made reference to a study done by the ISS called The Heroin Coast

- refers to the route of drugs such as cocaine and especially heroin - South Africa is currently known as **the Southern route**

Drugs and transnational crime

- The **Global Initiative Against Transnational Organised Crime**'s report on **Maritime Based drug trafficking**

- **in Eastern and Southern Africa**, 2023/2024, indicates that drug smuggling via ports involves various techniques to secure shipment which includes cargo delivery, ship-to-ship transfer, drop-off/GPS and so on.
- They said every year, **750 million containers** are shipped around the globe, but fewer than **2%** of these are inspected. “
- At any given time there are around 6 000 container ships travelling at sea. The busiest ports in the world handle up to 47 million twenty-foot equivalent units of containers annually. The busiest ports in Africa can accommodate up to 2.6 million twenty-foot equivalent units annually, with plans in place to expand these capacities.

Drugs and organised crime and Cape Flats gangs

- Shafiek Davids, chief operations officer, **Sultan Bahu Treatment Centre**, who has drug rehabilitation facilities across the Western Cape and country, said:
 - inroads by cartels meant an increase in drug sales by criminals who have found our shores an easy access point
 - if major cartels like the Colombians are using South Africa, especially the Western Cape, as a playground to distribute cocaine, it signals a potential influx of drugs
 - this poses a serious threat, as increased availability of cocaine could escalate gang wars among local gangs already involved in drug trafficking, including methamphetamine
 - the potential for heightened violence and drug abuse is a major worry, as it directly impacts the community we serve

Changing the language we use to talk about gangsterism

- Imraahn Mukaddam of the **Cape Crime Crisis Coalition**, which includes Gun Free SA, Western Cape Provincial Community Police Board, United Public Safety Front, the Mitchells Plain United Residents Association (Mura) and Inspire Network, said last week that in the past month more than 200 people were killed due to gunfire related to gangs.
- Mukaddam added that **the influx of cartels into the Western Cape should be deemed a national security threat.**
- “I believe **we need to relook at the language we use when dealing with crime and how gang-related crime has evolved from street gangs to international syndicates,**” he said. **“If we change the language when referring to these criminal networks and call them what they really are, we can change the response of the state in dealing with them.** Gangs have transformed into armed militias who recruit **child soldiers** to fight for control of territories where they establish parallel states.”
- **These armed militias are rebels against the state and the very communities they feed off.** It is the social and economic conditions in vulnerable communities which they manipulate to grow their territorial dominions.
- “I advocate that we should **replace the criminal rhetoric with more military conflict based language.** We should **treat these militias for what they are, which is a threat to national security** – just like you would treat **a situation of political insurrection** – then **all the resources of the state should and can be unleashed to suppress this rebellion and the occupied territories can be liberated from the criminal stranglehold of these warlords.**”

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Amended Traffic by-Law of 2021

- Amended Traffic by-law of 2021 was passed and promulgated in 2022.
- The penalty amounts was passed and published in the tariff schedules for the 2023 financial year.
- The impoundment of **private vehicles** started in late July 2023.
- The amended by-law also brought equity to impoundments to address complaints from the public transport sector that they are unfairly targeted by impoundments
- Illegal Street racing, reck and neck, drunk driving and other serious offences will be targeted by through the implementation of the by-law to ensure safer roads.

VISION:

The PCPG is open to all municipal and metropolitan police agencies in the South Africa to participate as a cooperative working group whereby fiscal responsibilities are achieved on police related commodities.

MISSION:

Dedicated to providing all PCPG agencies with effective, efficient solutions that meet appropriate safe operational, financial, environmental, legislated & technological needs. This will be achieved by exchanging information, standardizing common specifications and developing cooperative agreements for procurement purposes.

MANDATE:

The mandate of the PCPG shall include but is not limited to:

- The PCPG will at its first meeting and thereafter bi-annually, elect a chairperson and vice chairperson at one of its annual meetings.
- The PCPG reports to the Metro Police Chief's Forum and the participating municipalities through the PCPG chair or designate.
- The Chair of the PCPG will oversee two sub-committees: Clothing/Equipment and Fleet. Each sub-committee shall have its own Co-Chair.
- Meetings for the sub-committees may take place quarterly or on an as need basis as determined by the Chair/Co-Chair. Each sub-committee shall have a participating representative from the SAPS and each participating MPD or municipal policing service.
- Co-Chairs will ensure that meeting dates, agendas & minutes are circulated or posted on the PCPG website, once such is available, in a timely matter to keep all members informed;
- The exchange of information and research on police specific commodities;
- Standardise basic specifications when possible;
